Message from the Executive Director



April is Second Chance Month, a nation-wide effort to raise awareness of the unique challenges formerly incarcerated people experience when reintegrating into their communities. The CIC marked this month through participation in several reentry focused community events, such as the annual National Returning Citizens Conference, a family reunification event hosted by the DC Department of Corrections, and A Celebration of Second Chances, hosted by the Department of Justice's Office of the Pardon Attorney. Additionally, the organization is finalizing a documentary on the impact of the Incarceration Reduction Amendment Act (IRAA) and Second Chance Act, which serve as sentence modification opportunities for

incarcerated DC residents. The documentary will showcase first-person accounts of residents who were released due to these laws and their reentry experiences.

The CIC participated in the FY25 Budget Hearing before the Committee on the Judiciary & Public Safety. The hearing reviewed agency duties and discussed the support necessary to continue operations as required by the CIC's legislative mandates.

On April 30th, the CIC will host its next quarterly open board meeting. Members of the community are encouraged to attend. The meeting will take place on at 6:00 p.m. in the 2nd floor conference room of 1400 I Street NW. Community members and constituents can also access the meeting virtually [here](#).

Statistics on D.C. Residents in Custody

D.C. adults in BOP Custody:

DC Code offenders in custody, regardless of residency

2,487

*Decrease since January 1, 2024 (2,495 Adults in Custody)



D.C. adults in DOC Custody:

1,876

*Increase since February 29, 2024 (1,823 Adults in Custody)

BOP Updates

The average age of DC Adults in BOP custody is approximately 40.4 years old.

57% of male DC Code Offenders are located in medium and low security facilities.

There are 65 female DC Code Offenders. 63% are located in medium, low, and minimum security institutions. The remainder are located in BOP camps or administrative security (eg. medical and transfer facilities). There are no women in high security facilities.

DOC Updates

There are 1082 residents that are pretrial.

There are 1,292 DC Code Offenders at CDF (decrease), 583 at CTF (increase), 55 at CCB (decrease), and 1 at Fairview (decrease).

There are 136 residents housed in the DOC for parole violations (increase).

Under DYRS, there are 37 residents at the Youth Shelter Home (increase), 109 at Youth Services Center (increase), and 52 at New Beginnings (decrease) totaling 198.

The amount of DC residents in DOC custody has increased by approximately 17% in the last 90 days.

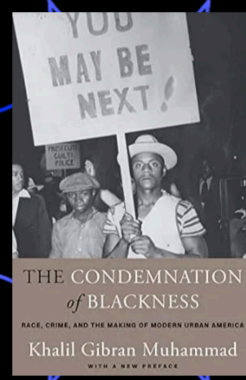
