Message from the Executive Director



Happy Holidays from the CIC! This month, the CIC partnered with community members to complete over 2,500 holiday postcards for DC residents in BOP custody. We appreciate the community's support in executing this project, which is always well-received by residents.

On December 14th, the CIC joined the Department of Human Rights and the League of Women Voters to observe the Special Election of a new Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner (ANC) for the Department of Corrections (DOC). Shameka Hayes was elected from eleven candidates to serve as the ANC for the DOC. She will be sworn into office during January 2024. A report on the election process is forthcoming.

The CIC conducted inspections of Department of Corrections (DOC) facilities this month, which included the Central Detention Facility (CDF), the Correctional Treatment Facility (CTF), and the Central Cell Block (CCB). The CIC also published the DOC's response to previous inspections of those facilities, as well as the inspection surrounding women housed in CTF. Those reports are available [here](#).

The last BOP inspection, which occurred in October, was to Federal Correctional Complex (FCC) Coleman, in Coleman, Florida. CIC staff identified frequent lockdowns, dissatisfaction with medical care, and lack of programming as the top issues cited by incarcerated residents at this complex. Reports on all four facilities within the FCC are forthcoming.

The CIC continues to build relationships with oversight agencies throughout the United States. As a result of these efforts, CIC Program Analyst Kareem McCraney was invited to speak at a panel for the National Association for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement's (NACOLE). He discussed agency best practices and lessons learned with other organizations and industry experts. We will continue to engage with other oversight entities to share experiences regarding the most effective methods of reporting on conditions of confinement for DC Code offenders, who are incarcerated throughout the country.

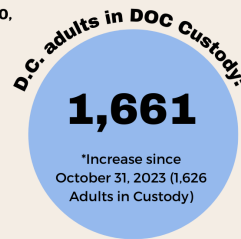
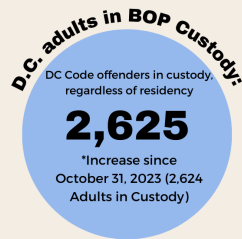

Statistics on D.C. Residents in Custody

Census as of November 30, 2023



BOP Updates as of November 30, 2023

There are **32 BOP DC residents on home confinement.**

There are **540 DC residents located in halfway houses.**

57% of male DC Code Offenders are located in medium and low security facilities.

Approximately **43% of female DC code offenders are in minimum or low security institutions. 26% are in medium institutions.**

The remainder are located in **BOP camps or administrative security (eg. medical and transfer facilities)**

There are **no women in high security facilities**

DOC Updates as of November 30, 2023

There are **928 residents that are pretrial and 20 residents are on Writ/Hold.**

There are **1,174 DC Code Offenders at CDF (increase), 485 at CTF (increase), 43 at CCB (increase), and 2 at Fairview (increase).**

There are **135 residents housed in the DOC for parole violations (decrease).**

Under **DYRS, there are 28 residents at the Youth Shelter Home (decrease), 80 at Youth Services Center (decrease), and 57 at New Beginnings (decrease) totaling 165.**

The amount of DC residents in DOC custody has **increased by approximately 17% in the last 90 days.**

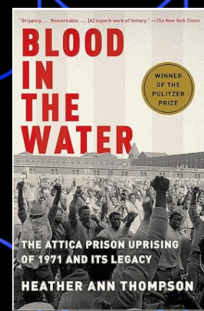
