Message from the Executive Director



During February, the CIC continued to fulfill our mandate to monitor, inspect, and report on DC adults in BOP and DOC custody. Amidst changes in leadership at DOC, the CIC plans to continue to communicate with DOC leadership and produce our DOC annual report as required by our MOA. After announcing a nationwide lockdown on January 31st for all BOP facilities, on February 7th, the BOP announced the end of lockdown for select facilities. We will continue to monitor any developments concerning the lockdown lift during the next few weeks. Our agency also hosted its annual board meeting where we discussed how to continue to improve in FY22. Coupled with more onsite inspections, we hope to continue to use surveys, research, and direct communications to collect data on conditions of confinement throughout 2022.

The CIC's website has received new updates for the new year. We recently added our [CIC Radars](#), where we report on recent BOP and DOC activity, to our Reports & Information page. Our agency's annual report and the DOC annual report have also been added. In our [agency's annual report](#), we discuss our onsite visits to facilities within the Bureau of Prisons, published reports, and how we navigated inspections in the midst of COVID-19. In our [DOC annual report](#), we detail how the CIC was able to perform an on-site visit and talk with staff and residents about conditions and their experiences both at work and in custody, respectively.

The CIC is actively developing community engagement projects for 2022. Through these projects, we hope to continue to engage and inform the public about D.C. residents. Lastly, the CIC has an upcoming inspection at Lewisburg to report on conditions for D.C. residents. This inspection will focus on medical issues, programming, and overall conditions of confinement. A report with the details of the inspection will be released in the coming months.

 - **Decrease since January 2022 (2,181 adults in custody)*
- The number of all DC Code adults who are in BOP custody, regardless of their residency, is **2,594**.



What We're Reading:
On The Outside: Prisoner Reentry and Reintegration
by David J. Harding, Jeffrey D. Morenoff, & Jessica J. B. Wyse

America's high incarceration rates are a well-known facet of contemporary political conversations. Mentioned far less often is what happens to the nearly 700,000 former prisoners who rejoin society each year. *On the Outside* examines the lives of twenty-two people—varied in race and gender but united by their time in the criminal justice system—as they pass out of the prison gates and back into the world. The book examines the challenges faced by formerly incarcerated citizens as they try to find work, housing, and stable communities. *On the Outside* delivers a powerful combination of hard data and personal narrative that shows why we continue to struggle with the social and economic reintegration of the formerly incarcerated.



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
