Data on D.C. residents in BOP Custody*

The average D.C. resident is approximately 350 miles from Union Station.

The facility with the most D.C. residents is USP Hazelton at 182 residents.

There are 5 facilities with over 100 D.C. residents. On average, those facilities are approximately 182 miles from Union Station.

DOC residents are 92.9 % Black, 3.62% White, 2.87% Hispanic, 0.07% Asian, and 0.54% Other. the District of Columbia (DC) population is 46.5% Black, 41.3% White, 11% Hispanic, and 4% Asian, and Hispanics who comprise 41.3%, 4%, and 11% of the DC Population are underrepresented. (DC Population

Women comprise less than 6% of the DC DOC population. 62.9% of women and 58.77% of men in custody have earned a high school diploma or GED. Nearly 5.03% of women and 3.19% of men reported they have a college degree.
