Message from the Executive Director



Happy Women's History Month from the CIC! The CIC is welcoming new candidates to join our team. If you have an interest in criminal justice and you possess strong writing and research skills, we encourage you to apply by visiting [HERE](#). Ideal candidates will have at least a Bachelor's degree related to English, and/or experience with editing documents and writing various types of reports.

Recently, the CIC completed a significant project aimed at educating our residents in BOP custody. This legislative booklet, developed by the CIC in collaboration with partner agencies, is designed to assist both BOP staff and incarcerated people in understanding the unique circumstances of DC Code offenders in BOP custody. The booklet also includes information that may be relevant to DC residents convicted and sentenced for federal offenses.

In conjunction with the DC Board of Elections, the CIC will soon issue a report on the 2024 elections held at the DC DOC. The law requires the Board of Elections and the CIC to submit a report to the Mayor and Council on the "Restore the Vote Amendment Act of 2020," which grants residents the right to vote while incarcerated in the BOP and DOC. If you have not already, please also view our documentary titled "IRAA: Creating Hope", which presents a historical and legislative framework for understanding the journey of six men released after the passage of the Incarceration Reduction Amendment Act (IRAA). The six men were all incarcerated as juveniles (under 18) and served at least twenty years in prison; although more recent legislation has resulted in potential sentence modification hearings for those who are under the age of 24 and have served at least 15 years. Statistics on D.C. Residents in Custody

DC Adults in BOP Custody

DC Code Offenders in Custody regardless of residency

2,535

*Increase since October 1, 2024 (2,530 in Custody)



DC Adults in DOC Custody

1,944

*Increase since January 31, 2025 (1,931 Adults in Custody)

BOP Updates

The average age of DC Adults in BOP Custody is approximately 41 years old

62% of male DC Code Offenders are located in medium and low security facilities

There are 71 female DC Code Offenders. 70% are located in med, low, and minimum security institutions. The remainder are located in BOP Camps and administrative security (e.g. medical and transfers) There are no females in high security facilities.

DOC Updates

There are 1,188 residents with pretrial status

There are 163 Residents housed in the DOC for parole violations (decrease)

The amount of DC Residents in DOC custody is approximately 0.67% higher than it was in November of 2024



"Progressive Prosecution" is a concept that advocates for a fundamental transformation of the criminal justice system, with prosecutors taking a leading role in dismantling the current system of mass incarceration that they helped create. This approach gained momentum following the high-profile killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and others in 2020, which highlighted the urgent need for reform. The book "Progressive Prosecution," edited by Taylor-Thompson and Thompson, presents a bold vision for reform, featuring contributions from practicing district attorneys and prominent scholars in law and criminal justice. The volume emphasizes that meaningful change must occur at the local level, with prosecutors adopting race-conscious strategies
